PACU President's Report

Overview of Strategic Achievements and Initiatives:

October 2022 - September 2024

he Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU) is pleased to present a comprehensive report detailing significant milestones and strategic initiatives undertaken in recent years. This report reflects PACU's collective efforts in advancing the landscape of Philippine education through policy advocacy, capacity building, fostering strategic partnerships, and the accomplishments of various committees.

PACU has been at the forefront of driving educational policy reforms, actively collaborating with government agencies, and ensuring that the voice of private education is well-represented in legislative discussions. Collaboration with other educational organizations and stakeholders has been a cornerstone of PACU's strategy to promote educational progress and innovation. The association's active leadership in the Coordinating Council of Philippine Educational Associations (COCOPEA) as chairperson in the remainder of PACU's term (2023- June 2024) and membership have proven and tested to be beneficial to ensure successful lobbying of better educational policies.

PACU and COCOPEA endorsed to President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. the appointment of the newly installed Department of Education (DepEd) Secretary, Hon. Juan Edgardo "Sonny" Angara, and Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) Director General, Hon. Francisco "Kiko" B. Benitez. Two highly worthy individuals are now at the helm of two of the three education agencies in the country.

Recently, PACU and COCOPEA hosted a dinner reception to welcome the newly appointed Secretary of the Department of Education, Hon. Juan Edgardo "Sonny" Angara, and the Director General of Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), Hon. Francisco "Kiko" B. Benitez, in July and September 2024, respectively.

PACU has responded proactively to government legislations and regulations that impact the academic sector by rallying industry leaders to stand firm and lobby our position on various legislative issues that could be beneficial or could adversely affect private educational institutions.

We effectively championed the passage of the "No Permit, No Exam Prohibition Act," also known as Republic Act No. 11984. A significant triumph for PACU was the transformation of focus and language to mandate that educational institutions support disadvantaged students. The law now ensures access to educational services without unreasonably encroaching on schools' right to enforce payment schemes crucial for their operations.

PACU also supported Senate Bill No. 379 or the Mental Health and Well-Being Promotion Act, which advocates for establishing Mental Health and Well-Being Centers and emphasizes the need for government subsidies to ensure that private schools can offer quality mental health services. The advocacy also calls for expanding counseling services to include online delivery, reflecting the changing needs of the educational community.

PACU addressed the revitalization of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) program, emphasizing the need to uphold academic freedom and respect the prerogatives of Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in determining program delivery methods. Additionally, PACU suggested incorporating elements of the National Service Training Program (NSTP) into the revitalized ROTC framework.

In response to a tragic hazing incident that shook the academic community, PACU released a position paper condemning all forms of violence and abuse within educational institutions. The association called for stricter enforcement of antihazing policies and greater accountability, emphasizing the need for a safer and more supportive environment for students.

PACU supported the bill to strengthen the Legal Education Board but raised concerns about potential infringements on the academic freedom of law schools. We called for balanced legislative support that recognizes the complementary nature of public and private education and urges provisions to protect the autonomy of educational institutions.

In Basic Education, PACU representatives participated in a K to 12 curriculum consultation workshop/s organized by the Department of Education. The workshop/s included discussions on decongesting and making relevant changes to the K to 12 Curriculum, MATATAG Curriculum, and Senior High School (SHS) Program Review. Recently, the SHS Curriculum consultation included topics such as the embedment of the TESDA training regulations, an increase in the number of hours for the SHS work immersion, and other curriculum flexibilities and solutions to address the job-skills mismatch and provide employment opportunities for SHS students who will be seeking employment upon graduation. Important feedback to help shape the curriculum review process was discussed and examined during the workshop.

Moreover, PACU was instrumental in developing the Public and Private Basic Education Complementarity Framework under DepEd Order No. 6, S. 2024. This initiative promoted collaboration between public and private educational institutions, fostering a more integrated approach to education in the Philippines. The organization also took proactive steps to address the proposed amendments to the school calendar year, as outlined in DepEd Order No. 22, S. 2023, by coordinating responses from member schools and facilitating a gradual shift in the academic calendar.

PACU acted swiftly to ensure that Autonomous and Deregulated Private Higher Education Institutions continue to enjoy most benefits under CMO No. 19, series of 2016, except for a few sections, 7, 11 (for graduate programs), 12, and 14, while their renewal applications are being processed. I am proud to announce that 53% of CHED's list of institutions that have Autonomous and Deregulated status as of 2021 are members of PACU, proving that our member institutions are at the forefront and aspire to continuously deliver quality education in the country with its dedication towards institutional quality improvement. We await the release of the 2024 CHED list soon.

Institutional Capacity Building, Government Industry Academe Collaboration towards Sustainability, Lifelong Education Pathways and Continuous Quality Improvement

Innovation and collaboration of private education institutions remain crucial in human capital and social development towards national progress. PACU's commitment to sustainable education to boost efficiency, quality access and responsiveness of education has been evident in its programmatic initiatives. PACU's institutional capacity-building efforts, global education and industry alignment were directly supported by the Private Education Assistance Committee's (PEAC) ASPIRE Program. PACU has strengthened its role in shaping educational leaders by launching several initiatives such as webinars, workshops, and summits/conferences focused on relevant and contemporary topics in education, such as generative artificial intelligence, internationalization of higher education, and the use of micro-credentials and digital badges in the promotion of lifelong education pathways.

Furthermore, PACU members engaged in significant events such as the COCOPEA Biennial Congress and PEAC's PhilEd Conference. The organization partnered with COCOPEA, CEAP, and Rex Education to organize the MATATAG Curriculum Summit, which fostered deep discussions on curriculum improvements and facilitated participation in DepEd's National Training of Regional Trainers. In alignment with its goals of enhancing educational leadership, PACU ensured that member institutions were well-informed about the CHED Scholarships under the Local Graduate Scholarships Office, such as the Global Academic Leadership Program (GALP), Wharton Online Management Masterclass and other Husay Scholarships, extending application deadlines to maximize participation. The association contributed to education policy workshops and dialogues with educational agencies and organizations to advance policies and programs.

Committee Accomplishment Reports

The accomplishments of PACU's various committees have been central to its overall success. Below is a summary of key achievements:

Membership Committee:

- **Membership Dues Amnesty Program:** Successfully implemented from May to July 2023, allowing 46 out of 91 member institutions with arrears from 2008-2023 to update their dues, generating Php 2.1 million in revenue. This program also led to the cleaning of membership records and an increase in active members.
- New Membership Applications: The committee welcomed the Medical Colleges of Northern Philippines and National University Laguna as new members. Ongoing applications include Mapua Malayan Colleges Davao, further strengthening PACU's community.
- **Strengthening Membership Guidelines:** Revised by-laws and internal policies for a more transparent membership process. The committee also conducted validation and benchmarking visits to better understand and address member needs, particularly in provincial areas.

Public Relations Committee:

Redesigned PACU Website

In 2023, the PR Committee launched a redesigned PACU website to enhance User Experience (UX) and User Interface (UI). The redesign created a visually appealing, user-friendly platform while prioritizing data security. The website remains a key resource for updates and information about PACU's activities.

• Biannual Newsletter

Between 2022 and 2024, the committee produced three newsletters, the fourth issue of which is the one you have on your hands. These newsletters covered significant topics in higher education, trends, and achievements of PACU member schools, celebrating milestones and awards.

Digital Tayo Workshop with Habi

In collaboration with Meta Philippines and Habi Education Lab, the PR Committee facilitated the Digital Tayo Teachers initiative, a digital literacy workshop series held in September and October 2023. Over 300 students from various PACU member schools, including Cebu Institute of Technology-University, participated. The initiative provided valuable resources aligned with technology courses in teacher education.

· Personalized Holiday Cards

The PR Committee designed and printed personalized Christmas cards for 2022-2024, ensuring brand consistency and cost-efficiency. This initiative reinforced PACU's internal and external brand presence.

Programs Committee:

Mental Health Awareness:

- * Raising Mental Health Awareness Among Schools: Addressed mental health concerns in academic institutions.
- * Suicide Prevention and Awareness in Higher Education Institutions: Focused on suicide prevention and included an info session on the College Experience Survey (CES).

• Leadership Development:

* The Art and the Practice of Deanship 4.0: Discussed the evolving role of deans, with a focus on digital transformation and leadership in the modern academic landscape.

• Financial Management:

* Financial Management for Educational Leaders: Provided guidance on managing school finances in a post-pandemic world.

• Artificial Intelligence:

- * The Rise and Perils of Artificial Intelligence: Initiated discussions on the role of AI in education, focusing on ethical implications.
- * Harnessing AI Potential: A Policy Writeshop on Acceptable Use in Education: Collaborated with the



Committee on Institutional Quality Improvement to draft policies on ethical AI use.

* Secure Assessment in the Age of AI: Focused on protecting academic integrity amid the rise of AIgenerated content in assessments.

Legal Committee:

• Constitutional and Legislative Advocacy

PACU consistently opposed amendments to the 1987 Constitution that would allow foreign ownership of educational institutions, emphasizing the protection of national patrimony.

Relevant endorsements:

* Resolutions of Both Houses No. 6 and No. 7 (Amending Economic Provisions of the 1987 Constitution)

• Educational Policy and Reform

PACU actively supported various bills and legislative reforms that impact the education sector, advocating for provisions that protect the academic freedom and sustainability of private educational institutions.

Key endorsements include:

- * Revitalized Reserve Officers Training Corps Act (ROTC): Advocacy for integrating NSTP components and preserving academic freedom.
- * Strengthening the Legal Education Board Bill: Emphasis on preventing encroachment on law school autonomy and limiting quasi-judicial powers.
- * K-10+2 Bill: Support for reviewing the K-12 program and cautioning against early exit programs.
- * CHED Memorandum Order for Autonomous and Deregulated Status: Ensuring PHEIs retain their benefits during renewal.
- * Proposed Amendments to the CHED Charter (Senate Bill No. 2270): Advocacy against burdensome administrative requirements.
- * Amendments to the Anti-Hazing Act of 2018 (Senate Bill No. 2271): Opposition to excessive penalties and administrative strain on PHEIs.

• Financial and Wage Policy

PACU advocated for exemptions and adjustments to financial obligations and wage orders, considering the economic challenges faced by private educational institutions.

Key endorsements include:

- * No Permit, No Exam Prohibition Act (RA No. 11984): Advocated for protecting schools' ability to enforce payment schemes.
- * Across-the-Board Wage Increase Act of 2023: Recommended measures to mitigate financial strain on PHEIs.

• Mental Health and Student Welfare

PACU supported legislative initiatives promoting student welfare and mental health services while advocating for implementation that considers institutional capacities.

Key endorsements include:

* Basic Education Mental Health and Well-Being Promotion Act: Emphasis on establishing clear guidelines for mental health centers and expanding online counseling services.

• Apprenticeship and Alternative Learning Modes

PACU pushed for structured apprenticeship programs and the institutionalization of flexible learning modalities to enhance education delivery in diverse settings.

Relevant endorsements:

- * National Apprenticeship Program Revisions: Advocacy for a robust regulatory framework to protect apprentices.
- * Full Implementation of Alternative Delivery Modes (ADMs): Support for integrating blended learning with robust quality assurance mechanisms.

Academic Calendar and Climate Considerations

PACU recognized the need for academic calendar adjustments but advocated for a flexible and gradual approach to avoid disruptions and align with global standards.

Relevant endorsements:

* DepEd Order No. 003, Series of 2024: Advocacy for HEI autonomy in setting academic year dates.

• Teacher Compensation and Quality Assurance

PACU endorsed policies aimed at improving teacher compensation and enhancing quality assurance in teacher education programs.

Relevant endorsements:

- * RA No. 11997 "Kabalikat sa Pagtuturo Act": Advocated for equitable treatment of private school teachers.
- * Quality Assurance Mechanisms for Teacher Education Programs: Called for a balanced and supportive approach to teacher education quality improvement.

Policy Committee:

Advocating for longstanding education reforms

The PACU Policy Committee has lobbied for policies recognizing the complementarity of private education in providing quality access to education in the Philippines. Key advocacies include Student Choice, Academic Freedom, and Reasonable Regulation of private education institutions. This includes working with COCOPEA's strategic plan for 2022-2025 and collaborating with the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM 2).

Key Legislative and Policy Discussions

PACU played an active role in discussing major legislative issues, including the No Permit, No Exam Prohibition Bill, now Republic Act No. 11984, and bills on ROTC, CHED's Flexible Delivery Modes, Autonomous and Deregulated Schools, and more. The committee also discussed emerging technologies, like generative AI, and their impact on education, proposing a roundtable discussion on this topic.

• Collaboration with EDCOM 2

PACU participated in key consultations with EDCOM 2, including a workshop on Quality Assurance for Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) and a profiling exercise to gather data for policy-making. Around 50 PACU member schools took part in this survey.

• Brainstorming Workshop on Solutions for Members

During the 2023 General Assembly, the Policy Committee led a workshop aimed at addressing critical issues affecting private education, including public-private education complementarity, funding and financial assistance, faculty development, and digital transformation.

• Stratbase Collaboration for Policy Advocacy

PACU's collaboration with Stratbase since April 2023 has led to successful lobbying for critical educational policies. The partnership focuses on addressing policy challenges through strategic advocacy, helping position PACU as a critical partner to the government in nation-building.

• Major Accomplishments

PACU's successful lobbying for the appointment of key education officials, including DepEd Secretary **Juan Edgardo Angara**, TESDA Director General **Jose Francisco "Kiko" Benitez**, and CHED Commissioner **Ethel Agnes Valenzuela**, has been a notable achievement in advancing the interests of private education.

Committee on Institutional Quality Improvement:

- LAMP Summits: Organized several summits addressing crucial topics:
 - * One Size Fits All? Education Trajectories, Transitions, and Transformations: Discussed the evolving educational landscape and best practices in implementing frameworks like the Philippine Oualifications Framework.
 - * Education Without Borders: Pathways to Internationalization for HEIs: Focused on internationalization and transnational education, promoting collaborations and sharing best practices.
 - * Lifelong Learning Pathways: Revolutionizing Education Through Microcredentials and Digital Badges: Highlighted the integration of micro-credentials in education and their potential to revolutionize lifelong learning.

AI Initiatives:

* *Harnessing AI Potential:* A Policy Writeshop on Acceptable Use in Education: Developed ethical guidelines for AI use in education, resulting in a guidebook template for PACU members.



- * *AI Summit 2024:* Addressed AI safety, capability, and policy development, emphasizing responsible AI use in education.
- **South Korea Benchmarking Programme:** A benchmarking visit that provided insights into global best practices in internationalization, lifelong learning, and e-learning.

Industry-Academe Linkage Committee:

- PACU Usapang Industriya on Cybersecurity: Focused on critical skills and training for cybersecurity
 roles, particularly in law enforcement, with significant participation and engagement.
- PACU Usapang Industriya on Workforce Development: Presented frameworks and case studies
 on successful government-industry-academe partnerships, highlighting pathways from education to
 employment.
- PACU-SeeMeCV Leaders' Workshop: Explored technological solutions for enhancing student career guidance and placement services, aligning educational offerings with industry needs.
- Ongoing review of Memorandum of Understanding
 - * Digital Marketers Association of the Philippines (DMAP) Certified Digital Marketer (CDM) Digital Marketing Fundamentals and other upskilling events and activities for students, alumni and faculty on digital marketing; and
 - * Eskwelabs for Learning Sprint on Generative AI in Education

Research Committee:

- **PACU-Euraxess Info Session:** Introduced EU research grants and fostered collaboration among Philippine researchers, engaging over 200 institutions.
- PACU-Thames Workshop on Mitigating Learning Loss: Addressed learning gaps in basic education, emphasizing remediation strategies for bridging these gaps.
- **PACU-USAID Info Session on Opportunity 2.0 Grants:** Focused on improving education, employment, and livelihood opportunities for out-of-school youths (OSYs), highlighting how HEIs can leverage these grants.
- PACU-USAID UPSKILL Collaboration: The Joint Research Collaboration aims to establish a research
 fellowship program between PACU and UPSKILL. PACU member schools will contribute junior or senior
 researchers who will collaborate with UPSKILL specialists on research projects. Additionally, PACU
 member institutions may apply to join the Accelerator Program to explore and implement innovative
 solutions within their campuses.

Reflections on Leadership and the Future of PACU

ACU's leadership reflects the association's unwavering commitment to advancing the educational landscape in the Philippines. The achievements detailed in this report are a testament to the collaborative efforts of PACU's members, driven by a shared vision of nation-building through transformative education. PACU's ongoing initiatives demonstrate a steadfast commitment to shaping the future of Philippine education, ensuring that it meets the demands of a rapidly changing world.

As PACU looks to the future, the organization remains dedicated to championing the interests of private education, advocating for academic freedom, and working towards a more inclusive and sustainable educational environment. PACU will continue to ensure that the passage and implementation of laws are relevant, incisive, and decisive in improving the well-being of students and all stakeholders in colleges and universities.

It has been a source of immense pride to contribute to the advancement of private education alongside such talented individuals. The challenges we faced were

Reevaluating Philippine Education: PACU's Stand on Key Issues in the Past Two Years

An Accomplishment Report by the PACU Legal Team (2022-2024)

t is often said that those who are not actively engaged in shaping their world are destined to be shaped by it. Silence and apathy are the enemies of well-thought-out laws and policies. In the field of education, it would be particularly detrimental not to participate in discussions on matters related to nation-building.

One of the commitments of the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU), as outlined in its *Credo*, is the attainment of the educational goals and objectives set forth in the Constitution, as well as the pursuit of educational reforms and innovative programs for national growth and development.

PACU is a staunch believer in participatory democracy as the firm foundation for policy formulation and decision-making on fundamental educational issues.

In this light, the PACU Legal Team reflects on the past two years, a period during which PACU has actively voiced its positions on key education issues, and collectively reevaluates *our education futures together*.

I. RESOLUTIONS OF BOTH HOUSES NO. 6 AND NO. 7 ON AMENDING THE ECONOMIC PROVISIONS OF THE 1987 CONSTITUTION

PACU, through its Legal Team, has submitted its Position Paper strongly objecting to bills proposing amendments to the present Constitution, particularly allowing foreign ownership of higher educational institutions.

While PACU appreciates the efforts of various legislators to spur economic growth and fast-track reforms to make the Philippines more globally competitive and aligned with global developments, it does not see the need to amend the Constitution at this point.

PACU has expressed concerns about proposed amendments to Paragraph 2, Section 4, Article XIV of the 1987 Constitution, emphasizing the need to protect national patrimony and keep education under Filipino control to preserve cultural integrity.

While supporting the goal of producing globally competitive citizens, PACU believes this can be achieved by strengthening existing laws, like the Transnational Higher Education Act (R.A. No. 11448), rather than through constitutional changes. After several public hearings, the proposed Resolutions remain pending in their subcommittees.

II. REVITALIZED RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS ACT (ROTC) ACT

While PACU supports the objective of the revitalized ROTC program to instill patriotism, nationalism, and respect for human rights in the youth, it urges Congress to reconsider the bill in light of the following concerns: (a) the preservation of academic freedom for private higher education institutions (PHEIs) in implementing the revitalized ROTC, including the determination of the optimal time to offer the program; and (b) the incorporation of key components of the National Service Training Program (NSTP).

PACU also argues that the revitalized ROTC must include sufficient safeguards to prevent the issues associated with the old mandatory ROTC program and address the needs of students with special circumstances. Ultimately, PACU

emphasizes that the exercise of police power over education in the implementation of the revitalized ROTC should be supervisory rather than controlling.

The bill remains pending at Second Reading.

III. STRENGTHENING THE LEGAL EDUCATION BOARD BILL

While PACU fully supports the proposed independence and fiscal autonomy of the Legal Education Board, it respectfully urges our legislators to review and revisit the provisions of the proposed bills, specifically regarding: (a) the grant of quasi-judicial powers to the Legal Education Board concerning disputes between schools, their faculty members, and students; and (b) potential encroachments on the academic freedom of law schools.

The bill remains pending at Second Reading.

IV. NO PERMIT, NO EXAM PROHIBITION ACT (REPUBLIC ACT NO. 11984)

PACU has consistently advocated for sustainable measures that make educational services more accessible to Filipinos, including privately funded scholarships, subsidies, discounts, assistance, and payment that balance schemes schools' operational needs with their mission to provide transformative private education to students, regardless of their background.

In this context, PACU respectfully highlighted the implications of Senate Bill No. 1359, particularly its potential to unduly infringe upon the academic freedom and management prerogatives of PHEIs, and violate the principle of non-impairment of contracts. Additionally, PACU emphasizes that stakeholders benefit from payment schemes or installment

plans, which the original version of the bill sought to prohibit.

The bill was ultimately signed into law by President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. on March 11, 2024, but not without PACU's efforts to advocate for provisions that protect and uphold the sustainability of PHEIs, particularly during the Bicameral Conference Committee's reconciliation of differing Senate and House versions.

Amajor victory for PACU in this process was the shift in focus and language from *prohibited acts*, punishable by fines and administrative sanctions, to a *mandate* requiring educational institutions to support disadvantaged students in the final version, now **Republic Act No. 11984**.

The law, now aligned with its intended spirit of ensuring access to educational services regardless of personal or socioeconomic circumstances—a goal PACU fully supports—does so without unduly encroaching on the inherent right of schools to enforce payment schemes or installment plans, as these fees are the lifeblood of our schools' operations.

V. PROPOSED CHED MEMORANDUM ORDER FOR THE GRANT OF AUTONOMOUS AND REGULATED STATUS TO PRIVATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The proposed guidelines for granting Autonomous and Deregulated status to PHEIs needed reconsideration and recalibration, as many PHEIs across the country were at risk of losing their status.

PACU's swift response was instrumental in ensuring that Autonomous and Deregulated PHEIs could continue to enjoy their benefits during the interim period. As a result, these institutions retain all the benefits under CMO No. 19, series of 2016, except for sections 7, 11 (for graduate programs), 12, and 14, while

their applications for renewal or upgrading are being processed.

VI. THE BASIC EDUCATION MENTAL HEALTH AND WELL-BEING PROMOTION ACT

PACU supports the bill's objectives on mental health but emphasizes that establishing and operating Well-being Mental Health and Centers requires: (a) Consultation mental health with qualified professionals; (b) Clearly defined roles and responsibilities; (c) Specific qualifications and functions personnel (d) Coordination mechanisms for schools unable to establish their own centers: and (e) Utilization of existing Guidance and Counseling Offices. PACU also advocates for expanding the definition of "Counseling" to include online delivery for more feasible services.

The bill remains pending at the Bicameral Conference Committee.

VII. SENATE BILLS NO. 1083, 1513, 1912 AND 2088 – REVISIONS TO THE NATIONAL APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

PACU urged enterprises and industry partners to recognize the benefits of investing in Quality Apprenticeship programs. It outlined key components that should be integrated into the National Apprenticeship program to establish a robust regulatory framework that ensures the protection of apprentices.

Additionally, PACU sought clarification on the potential impact of the proposed bills on existing guidelines, particularly DO 30-2017, CMO No. 22, s. 2013 (Policies, Standards, and Guidelines on the Student Internship Abroad Program), and CMO No. 104, s. 2017, which all pertain to the education sector.

The above-referenced bills were substituted by Senate Bill No. 2491 on November 21, 2023, which was



subsequently sent to the archives on August 12, 2024.

VIII. K-10+2 BILL

PACU supports the current K to 12 program and is concerned that institutionalizing an early exit could adversely impact employment, exacerbate poverty, and hinder the Philippines' global educational standing. PACU firmly believes that an appropriate first step is to review and evaluate the K to 12 program through comprehensive research and analysis, and urges Congress to give due consideration to the recommendations of the EDCOM II.

The bill remains pending with the House Committee on Basic Education.

IX. ACROSS THE BOARD WAGE INCREASE ACT OF 2023

The Philippine minimum wage for 2024 varies across the regions. Senate Bill No. 2002 was subsequently substituted by Senate Bill No. 2534, which proposes a across the board daily minimum wage increase of One Hundred Pesos (P100) for private sector employees and workers for all regions.

PACU asserts that PHEIs have faced significant financial losses due to educational reforms, the pandemic, declining enrollment from free tertiary education initiatives, and recent wage increase orders. To address these issues, PACU recommends: (a) exempting institutions with tuition increases from certain financial obligations; (b) applying salary increases granted under RA No. 6728 to mandatory wage increases; and (c) treating voluntary or collectively bargained wage increases applicable to any wage order.

Senate Bill No. 2534 was approved on Third Reading on February 19, 2024, and has been sent to the House of Representatives for concurrence. The bill has remained pending.

This may have been rendered moot and academic, inasmuch as the Regional Wage Board in the National Capital Region has mandated a wage increase of P35.00/daily for private sector employees. The new minimum wage for NCR private sector employees now ranges from P608 to P645.00/day effective 17 July 2025, while the kasambahays will now have a minimum wage of P6,500.00/month. With this development, other regions are anticipated to follow and adjust their rates accordingly.

X. SENATE BILL NO. 2270 OR THE AMENDMENTS TO THE CHED CHARTER

Senate Bill No. 2270 proposes amendments to the charter of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), which PACU argues could impose significant burdens and punitive measures on PHEIs. PACU highlights concerns about the introduction of Section 8(f), which mandates PHEIs to submit compliance reports three times a year to both CHED and Congress.

The association asserts that this requirement imposes an undue administrative and financial burden on institutions already managing multiple reporting obligations, suggesting that annual reporting CHED would be sufficient. Additionally, the proposed penalties including program termination, school closure, and a PHP 5 million fine for non-compliance—are viewed as excessively severe and potentially jeopardizing the viability of smaller institutions.

PACU urges the 19th Congress to establish clear parameters for CHED's oversight responsibilities to ensure effective regulation without imposing undue burdens, while allowing educational institutions to retain autonomy in their affiliations and partnerships. The bill was read on First Reading and remains pending in the Senate Committee on Higher,

Technical and Vocational Education.

XI. SENATE BILL NO. 2271 OR THE AMENDMENTS TO THE ANTI-HAZING ACT OF 2018

PACU firmly believes that the proposed amendments—such as the requirement to submit compliance reports to both CHED and Congress, and the imposition of severe penalties, including program termination, school closure, and fines of P5,000,000.00—are detrimental to PHEIs due to their excessive and unnecessary nature.

PACU suggests setting clear parameters for CHED's supervisory responsibilities to ensure reasonable oversight without imposing undue burdens on PHEIs.

The bill was read on First Reading on August 1, 2023, and was referred to the Senate Committees on Public Order and Dangerous Drugs, and Justice and Human Rights, where it remains pending.

XII. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ORDER NO. 003, SERIES OF 2024 AND POTENTIAL CALENDAR SHIFT IN HIGHER EDUCATION

PACU recognizes the rationale behind DepEd Order No. 003, series of 2024, which proposes shifting the academic calendar to June-March to avoid the extreme heat of April and May. However, starting the academic year in June introduces challenges due to the rainy season, which has historically caused significant disruptions. While this shift may address some weather-related concerns, it does not fully resolve the issues posed by extreme weather conditions.

PACU advocates for a comprehensive approach that includes investing in weather-resilient infrastructure, adopting flexible learning modalities, and climate-proofing schools. This includes upgrading technology, training educators in digital platforms,

and ensuring curriculum continuity during adverse weather. Coordination with private schools, many of which align their schedules with international academic calendars to enhance student mobility and global collaboration, particularly within ASEAN, is essential to maximize international educational opportunities.

PACU further contends that CHED should grant HEIs the autonomy to set their academic year dates within the legal framework of RA No. 7797. Currently, HEIs align their calendars with international standards. commencing in August, September, or October. In light of the Philippines' recent accession to the Washington Accord on June 12, 2024, PACU supports gradual adjustments to the academic calendar rather than abrupt changes, to avoid disruptions to established routines and contractual agreements.

XIII. FULL IMPLEMENTATION OF ALTERNATIVE DELIVERY MODES

PACU supports the systematic integration of alternative delivery modes (ADMs) in education, which gained prominence during the COVID-19 pandemic and should be implemented with robust quality assurance mechanisms. ADMs. including blended learning, enhance educational flexibility, accessibility, inclusivity, particularly students in remote or underserved areas and those with disabilities. PACU advocates for institutionalizing blended learning as a permanent option, combining in-person and online education to offer flexibility and continuity during emergencies.

While valuing face-to-face interactions for comprehensive basic education, PACU also supports full-distance learning during severe health conditions or public health emergencies to ensure uninterrupted education while safeguarding student well-being.

XIV. IMPLEMENTING RULES OF REP. ACT NO. 11997, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE "KABALIKAT SA PAGTUTURO ACT"

PACU appreciates the intent of RA No. 1197, which institutionalized a teaching allowance for public school teachers.

However, PACU has concerns about the proposed IRR, particularly Section 6, which lacks transparency in how the allowance is used since no receipts are required, raising questions about accountability. Additionally, the allowance's tax exemption could widen the compensation gap between public and private school teachers, potentially increasing dissatisfaction and contributing to the migration of teachers from private to public schools.

PACU urges that similar support be extended to private school teachers to reflect the complementary roles of both sectors and address these issues.

XV. THE ADOPTION OF QUALITY ASSURANCE MECHANISMS FOR TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The Technical Panel for Teacher Education (TPTE) of CHED presented proposed amendments to Section 25 of CMO Nos. 74 to 80 and 82, series of 2017, concerning sanctions for pre-service teacher education degree programs.

The proposed tiering system assesses institutions based on their passing rates over the past three years and adherence to Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) standards. Closure is mandated only for Level 1 institutions with significant noncompliance, while Levels 2, 3, and 4 will receive technical assistance to address deficiencies. Institutions failing to meet targets after two years will be barred from enrolling new students.

PACU contends that CHED should focus on its supportive role, as envisioned by the 1987 Constitution, rather than imposing punitive measures. It highlights that Level 1 institutions do not receive technical assistance or a remediation period, which it deems unreasonable. PACU advocates for an expanded intervention strategy, with phase-out or closure as last resorts, and calls for a comprehensive impact assessment of the proposed measures. This assessment should address potential disruptions to teacher supply under RA No. 8190, impacts on educational continuity, and the complementarity between public and private institutions.

Additionally, PACU recommends adjusting thresholds based on the number of test-takers and seeks clarity on the delineation of authority between the Teacher Education Council (TEC) and CHED to ensure consistent quality assurance in teacher education programs.

Throughout our submissions in the past two years, PACU Legal has respectfully maintained that the unqualified power to control education is withheld from the State. In this sense, when the Constitution gives the State supervisory power, it is understood that what it enjoys is a *supportive power*, that is, the power of oversight over all educational institutions. It includes the authority to check, but not to interfere.

PACU acknowledges that the State may impose requirements, set conditions, prescribe restrictions, and ensure compliance, as it is vested with ample authority to set minimum standards to be met by all educational institutions.

However, in no way should supervision and regulation be equated to State control. PACU will remain steadfast in maintaining this position in the years to come.



Membership Committee Accomplishment Report: 2022-2024

s we reflect on the past two years, it is with great pride and a sense of accomplishment that we present the achievements of the PACU Membership Committee. Our collective efforts have yielded significant progress in three critical areas: improving the collection of membership dues, processing and evaluating membership applications, and strengthening membership participation and guidelines. We feel that these accomplishments have not only enhanced our organizational efficiency but also fortified our community ties.

1. Improving Collection of Membership Dues through the Membership Dues Amnesty Program

One of our most notable achievements has been the successful implementation of the Membership Dues Amnesty program. Recognizing the need to address outstanding arrears and encourage timely payments, the PACU Board approved the implementation of this program from May to July 2023 to provide members with at least 5 consecutive years and 10 consecutive years of arrears a limited-time opportunity to settle their dues without penalties. The results have been remarkable:

- Increased Member Participation: The amnesty program significantly increased the number of members with updated dues. Many members who had previously fallen behind in their payments took advantage of this opportunity to bring their accounts current. A total of 46 out of 91 member institutions with arrears from 2008-2023 availed of the program, significantly increasing the number of active members of the Association.
- Revenue Generation: The program generated an additional Php 2.1 million in revenues from membership dues and PR fees. These funds have been instrumental in supporting PACU's initiatives and enhancing the services we provide to our members.
- Cleaning of Membership Records: As a succeeding step
 to the Amnesty Program and to ensure the integrity and
 accountability of our membership, the committee initiated
 the process of reviewing and cleaning the membership
 records of schools with 10 or more consecutive years of
 arrears, as well as those that have already ceased operations
 or have been subsumed by other educational entities.

This essential step allows us to maintain a transparent and active membership base, enabling us to better serve our members' needs and interests. This included the updating of the official PACU Viber Group where important communication and announcements to the membership are disseminated. Official representatives of member schools, particularly those that have updated their membership as a result of the amnesty program, have now also been included in the community.

 Member Retention: By easing the financial burden on our members, we have not only retained existing members but also fostered a stronger sense of community and commitment within our organization.

This initiative has demonstrated the power of collaboration and understanding in achieving financial stability while maintaining strong member relationships.

2. Processing and Evaluation of Membership Applications

The Membership Committee has diligently worked to ensure that the process of evaluating and accepting new members is thorough, transparent, and efficient. Over the past two years, we have successfully processed several membership applications, resulting in notable additions to our PACU family:

Medical Colleges of Northern Philippines: After a
comprehensive evaluation of membership requirements
and a validation visit to Cagayan Valley on March 2-3, 2023,
we welcomed the Medical Colleges of Northern Philippines
as a new regular member under the leadership of President
Christian R. Guzman. Their inclusion has enriched our
community with their commitment to medical education
and excellence, as well as strengthened the Association's
presence in northern Luzon.





• National University Laguna: Similarly, after careful evaluation and a validation visit conducted on February 6, 2024, National University Laguna, headed by President Renato Carlos Ermita, Jr., was also successfully accepted as an associate member of the Association. Their diverse academic programs and dedication to student success align perfectly with PACU's values.





• Ongoing Applications: We are currently processing the membership application of Mapua Malayan Colleges Davao, under the leadership of Mapua University President, Dr. Dodjie S. Maestrecampo. The evaluation process is underway, and we anticipate their inclusion will further strengthen our association.

These new members bring fresh perspectives, expertise, and energy to PACU, enhancing our collective capabilities and broadening our impact on higher education in the Philippines.

3. Strengthening Membership Guidelines

A key focus of the Membership Committee has been the review and enhancement of our membership guidelines. Recognizing the need for clear, consistent, and fair policies, we undertook a review of the by-laws and internal policies governing membership. Our efforts have included:

- Review of By-Laws: We reviewed the PACU by-laws to see how they reflect current needs and realities, as well as remain true to values and ensure the sustainability of the organization. The results of which are what we feel are timely and relevant revisions which have been proposed to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.
- Internal Policies: A review of internal policies and guidelines within the Membership Committee was also undertaken, with the purpose of streamlining the membership process, making it more transparent and efficient. These proposed changes aim to simplify the application procedures and clarify membership criteria.
- Validation and Benchmarking Visits: As part of our commitment to strengthening ties among members, we conducted validation visits to member applicants and timed these with benchmarking visits to nearby member institutions. These visits were particularly focused on interacting with members in the provinces, enabling us to touch base and understand their unique challenges and needs. These interactions have fostered stronger relationships and a sense of solidarity within PACU.



Accomplishment Report: 2022-2024

or the past two years, the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU) Programs Committee has offered a number of webinars and seminars to our member schools. The committee provided a variety of topics that were highly beneficial to schools, as reflected in participant evaluations. These events were targeted at diverse groups, including Guidance Counselors, College Deans, Assistant Deans, Financial Affairs Managers, faculty, and Presidents of Colleges and Universities.

Below is a summary of the key activities sponsored by the Programs Committee from 2022 to 2024:

Webinar 1: Raising Mental Health Awareness Among Schools as We Transition to a Better Normal

Date: February 3, 2023

PACU kicked off the academic year 2023 with a webinar focused on mental health awareness. This event provided a platform for educators, administrators, and mental health professionals to address the growing mental health concerns in academic institutions, especially in the context of transitioning to a post-pandemic educational landscape. The webinar featured prominent mental health experts, psychologists, and registered guidance counselors who shared insights and best practices. They emphasized the importance of creating a supportive and caring environment within schools to nurture the mental well-being of students, faculty, and staff. 


Webinar 4: The Rise and Perils of Artificial Intelligence

Date: December 13, 2023

Building on the interest generated by a previous talk on Artificial Intelligence (AI) during PACU's General Assembly, this webinar delved deeper into how AI is shaping the future of education. The discussions provided a roadmap for responsible and ethical AI use in academic settings.

- **Dr. Ma. Mercedes T. Rodrigo:** Head of the Ateneo Laboratory for Learning Sciences and a professor in the Department of Information Systems and Computer Science at Ateneo de Manila University. Discussed the broad strokes of AI in academia.
- **Dr. Eugene Rex L. Jalao:** Professor at the Department of Industrial Engineering and Operations Research and Program Coordinator for the AI Program at the University of the Philippines. Addressed ethical policies regarding AI in higher education.
- **Dr. Leopoldo N. Valdez Jr.:** From Holy Angel University, shared insights on the rise of AI in Philippine higher education, discussing its benefits, challenges, and future implications.





Following the successful webinar, the committee, in collaboration with CIQI, organized a policy writeshop titled "Harnessing AI Potential: A Policy Writeshop on Acceptable Use in Education."

The event, held at Our Lady of Fatima University in Valenzuela, was a face-to-face workshop that produced significant outcomes. The resulting policy recommendations were submitted to a summit at the University of Santo Tomas. These guidelines are now serving as a model for the use of AI in educational institutions, demonstrating PACU's pioneering efforts in this area.

A total of 234 participants attended the write-shop. The participants were Presidents, Vice Presidents, School Directors, Academic Heads, MIS Directors, Registrars, Deans, and Faculty.

The session provided valuable information for educational institutions interested in participating in the CES 2024 Kickoff Event, as well as opportunities for engagement and collaboration within the CES network.




Webinar 6: Secure Assessment in the Age of AI: Protecting Professional Standards in Education Date: July 24, 2024

Policy Committee Accomplishment Report: 2022-2024

Advocating for longstanding education reforms

The PACU Policy Committee continues to lobby for policies in recognition of the complementarity role of private education and its contribution to providing quality access to education in the Philippines. We advocate for Student Choice, Academic Freedom, and Reasonable Regulation of private education institutions.

The Policy Committee and the PACU Executive Committee, in collaboration with the Legal and Legislative Committee, conducted regular and emergency meetings to discuss recommendations for PACU's strategic plans and policy directions in the two-year term. The committee discussions were cross-referenced with the three-year Strategic Plan for 2022-2025 of the Coordinating Council of Private Educational Associations (COCOPEA) and the two-year priority areas and issues of the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM 2).

COCOPEA Priorities for 2023-2025 are on Strengthening complementarity between public and private entities, Expansion of GASTPE in the elementary level, increasing the amount and number of subsidies/vouchers for GASTPE and SHS, Expanding the voucher system to cover TVET, Review CHED qualifications for HEIs on Tertiary Education Subsidy; Ensure active participation in EDCOM 2; Strengthen academegovernment-industry collaboration specifically for TVET and higher education; Provide/Increase Teacher Salary Subsidy for all levels; Advocate for policies (TESDA and CHED) that will enable for-profit educational institutions to receive grants from government; Standardize measures of quality, as well as accreditation metrics for public and private education.

COCOPEA's secondary priorities include advocating for the even distribution of grants to public and private institutions, studying measures to ensure competitive neutrality between public and private institutions, initiating quality upgrading programs within COCOPEA, building the private education brand (with parents, students, employers, policymakers), improving understanding of private education concerns, and building an advocacy network to support private education.

The topics and issues that were discussed in several policy committee meetings include the carrying capacity of Private schools vis-a-vis DepEd, LGU, SUCs & LUCs, portability of vouchers, accreditation landscape; capacity building on regulation policy and regulation economics for DepEd/CHED; School-based Management (SBM). For the bills affecting the Philippine education ecosystem, the committee discussed

the following: ROTC Bill, No Permit, No Exam Prohibition Bill, which later became Republic Act No. 11984; Constitutional Amendments; and the impact of the Mandanas Ruling. CHED concerns include the Application for Increase of Tuition and Other School Fees (TOSF); CMO 16 s. 2022 or the Flexible delivery mode; Autonomous and Deregulated schools; UNIFAST; Maritime Education: Marina (and blacklisting of international certifying body); Deped concerns: how to get involved in complementarity; MATATAG curriculum review; Reorganization of DepEd key officials; Infrastructure plan for public schools and International Large Scale Assessment (ILSAs) Test Preparation. Other topics on emerging technologies or Gen AI applications, such as Chat GPT and AI chatbots and their impact on education, were also discussed, and a proposal for a roundtable discussion was made.

Collaboration with Edcom 2

PACU and Edcom 2 Executive Director Karol Mark Yee held a consultation meeting on August 22, 2024. Dir. Yee presented the seven (7) committees that are working and doing consultations on EDCOM 2's priority areas and issues, which include the following:

- 1. Early Childhood Care And Development (ECCD)
- 2. Basic Education
- 3. Higher Education
- 4. Teacher Education And Development
- 5. Technical Vocational Education & Training (TVET) and Lifelong Learning
- 6. Governance And Finance
- 7. Cross-Cutting

For Higher Education, Year 1 priorities include two main areas. The priority area is on Quality Assurance particularly on Typology-/Outcomes-Based Quality Assurance Towards More Autonomous and Deregulated HEIs for innovations in teaching, Research, and public service. The target outcome is to develop a horizontal typology or typologies depending on the result of a data science-based clustering of PHEIs, SUCs, and LUCs and stakeholder consultations. Develop two vertical typologies-by level of autonomy and designation (e.g., national, regional, local HEI). The second priority area is access to quality higher education, specifically improving access to quality higher education. The target outcome for this is a review of the Implementation of the Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act to Identify the issues and implementation bottlenecks [e.g., Did free tuition and TES give equal opportunity to quality Tertiary Education in public and private institutions? What are the implementation



bottlenecks and how can they be addressed?] Study equity-based tuition models (e.g., socialized).

EDCOM 2 requested PACU member Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) to participate in the Profiling of Private HEIs. The participants were made to respond to the first descriptive questionnaire in aid of policy-making that aims to capture profiles of HEIs and collect data on existing quality assurance mechanisms. The survey covers several sections:

- 1. Enrollment and graduation figures
- 2. Programs offered
- 3. Faculty profile
- 4. Local and international linkages
- 5. Internal quality assurance mechanisms
- 6. Participation in external quality assurances
- 7. CHED-defined quality assurance

Around fifty (50) PACU member schools participated in the survey. The results will be used for the EDCOM 2 Year 2 Report under the Priority Area of Quality Assurance.

Brainstorming Workshop on Designing Solutions For & From Members

The policy committee conducted a Brainstorming Workshop on Designing Solutions For & From Members during the Annual General Assembly on September 30, 2023. The workshop objective/s are to discuss critical issues and concerns of PACU Members. Particularly to determine current education policies and legislations affecting private education; to bring out operational (CHEd, DepEd, etc) concerns that may lead to developing PACU interventions and programs; to draw out current strategies and solutions from PACU Members and to recommend best practices and plans to improve PACU's involvement and execution of its programs to align with the priorities.



The Policy Committee Chair presented issues to the membership. It were categorized into three emerging themes: Complementarity of Public And Private Education, Reasonable Regulation, and Quality Education. Under each theme were the topics such as the E-GASTPE/Voucher Bill, Amendment of the UNIFAST Law, DepEd MATATAG Curriculum (DM 54 s. 2023) and K to 10 + 2 Bill, Amendments to the CHED Charter, No Permit, No Exam Prohibition, Revision of DO 88 s 2010 and a QA Bill to be filed by EDCOM2.

After the brainstorming session, the key themes below were drawn out from the group activity:

- Review of Regulations & Government Policies: a significant focus on navigating the regulatory landscape.
- Internationalization/Globalization: need for alignment with global standards for international expansion and student mobility.
- Funding & Financial Assistance: Review and restructure the current funding and financial assistance programs to increase government subsidies and funding for students and teachers and grants for institutional research, development, and innovation. Explore other PPP arrangements.
- 4. Faculty & Employee Development: capacity building and short-term training and retention programs for faculty.
- Collaboration & Partnerships: building strategic partnerships for both public-private educational institutions and local and international collaborations.
- 6. Digital Transformation and assessment audit: a focus on adopting new technologies, from understanding AI to digital infrastructure, and performing a quick audit of current technological infrastructure and identifying immediate gaps.

Forging collaborations and crafting a coalition roadmap will pave the way for a sustainable and viable future for Philippine private education.

PACU has worked with Stratbase from April 2023 to the present on the "No Permit, No Exam prohibition bill." The rectification of the No Permit, No Exam Law is critical to school operations, and through this advocacy, we have demonstrated the potential of PACU, in alliance with private education stakeholders, to become a strong positive force in shaping government policies to address policy challenges confronting the sector.

In anticipation of more challenging regulatory issues that would affect the private educational sector, there is an opportunity to build a formidable alliance of stakeholders that can be mobilized into a strong constituency of advocates that can proactively shape government policies by enabling reforms that would strengthen the capacity of its institutions to deliver the highest quality of education for the workforce the country needs for a sustainable and progressive economic trajectory. Seeing this need for strong Political Management and Strategic Policy Advocacy Engagement, PACU has renewed its engagement with Stratbase from June 01, 2024 to May 31, 2025.

Through the leadership of PACU, Stratbase has engaged the whole private education sector in a successful campaign to overcome serious policy challenges that would have caused long term, and even existential repercussions to PACU

members and the entire private education stakeholders.

With the help of Stratbase, we will gather data through qualitative and quantitative studies (Focus Group Discussion and nationwide baseline survey) to determine the most critical issues that need immediate, medium term, and long term focus and action. The data will be the basis for consensus and guidance to implement a strategic advocacy and communication campaign that will proactively shape relevant government policies to effectively address issues and initiate reforms that promote the interest and strengthen the private education sector. Stratbase shall give counsel on how

PACU and the private education sector can position as a critical partner of government in nation building.

The increasing number of enrollment in the LUCs is a major area of concern.

Another marked accomplishment of PACU includes the successful lobbying for the appointment of DepEd Secratary, CHED Commissioner/s and TESDA Director General. PACU has successfully endorsed Secretary Juan Edgardo Angara, TESDA Director General Hon. Jose Francisco "Kiko" Benitez and CHED Commissioner Ethel Agnes Valenzuela.

Committee on Institutional Quality Improvement

Accomplishment Report: 2022-2024

he Committee on Institutional Quality Improvement (CIQI) is dedicated to advancing Philippine higher education. CIQI endeavors to enhance educational quality by cultivating a culture of continuous improvement among member institutions. This is achieved through knowledge sharing, collaborative initiatives, innovative quality metrics, and advocacy for robust performance benchmarks.

The LAMP Summit, CIQI's flagship program, is a cornerstone in this pursuit of excellence. This collaborative platform empowers institutions to elevate performance by exchanging best practices and quality assurance strategies. Through the LAMP Summit, CIQI demonstrates its commitment to institutional growth and development, contributing significantly to the overall quality of Philippine higher education.

Unlike traditional webinars, the LAMP Summit prioritized interaction and collaboration among private higher education leaders. Its goal was to identify shared challenges, foster connections, and stimulate partnerships within the sector.

Building on the success of its initial summits focused on leadership transitions (September 9, 2021), hybrid learning (November 11, 2021), and building school spirit during the pandemic (March 30, 2022), CIQI launched three other LAMP Summits for the past two years. The early events laid the groundwork for addressing the evolving challenges and opportunities in higher education, post-pandemic.

The fourth LAMP Summit delved into the complexities of education, questioning traditional approaches and exploring diverse learning paths. The fifth edition focused on expanding the global reach of private higher education institutions through international partnerships and programs. The sixth summit explored the potential of micro-credentials and digital badges to revolutionize lifelong learning.

In addition to the LAMP Summit series, CIQI has undertaken other significant initiatives. Collaborating with the Programs committee, CIQI organized a policy on "Harnessing AI Potential: A Policy Writeshop on Acceptable Use in Education." Furthermore, CIQI partnered with the Pontifical University of Santo Tomas to host the AI Summit 2024, centered on "Advancing AI Capability Promoting AI Safety."

Future Plans

To navigate the evolving higher education landscape, CIOI prioritizes strategic directions aligned with the needs of education stakeholders. Digital transformation will be accelerated through instructional design, AI, and online learning. Quality assurance will be strengthened through rigorous accreditation, benchmarking of best practices and outcomes-based approaches. Expanding global partnerships, fostering student mobility, and promoting transnational education are imperative. Curriculum innovation, faculty development, and student success, including inclusive and lifelong education opportunities, are core to our mission. Integrating technical-vocational education and higher education through credit transfer and work-study programs is essential. Strengthening higher education policy, fostering collaboration among institutions, and ensuring the sustainability of all institutions, especially smaller ones, are essential. We will also proactively explore emerging trends like AI and sustainability to address societal challenges and shape the future of education.

By prioritizing quality improvement and innovation, we empower institutions to excel and produce graduates ready for the future. As the educational landscape evolves, PACU will continue to lead the way.

The following activities were organized by the CIQI committee in 2022-2024:

PACU and University of Santo Tomas conducts the 4th LAMP Summit, Ignites Transformation in Higher Education

Over 340 higher education leaders gathered at the 4th LAMP Summit on March 29-30, 2023, to chart a new direction for Philippine education. Held in a hybrid format at the University of Santo Tomas and other venues, the summit, themed "One Size Fits All?? Education Trajectories, Transitions, and Transformations," brought together academicians, administrators, and industry experts. Discussions focused on the Fourth Industrial Revolution, the digital economy, micro-credentials, and educational transitions, with an emphasis on adapting institutions to meet evolving student and workforce needs.

Participants explored quality assurance and outcomes-based learning to create flexible pathways for students. PACU and Manila Central University organizes the 5th LAMP Summit on November 20, 2023, Education without Borders: Pathways to Internationalization and Transnational Education in Higher Education

The 5th Leadership and Management Perspectives (LAMP) Summit on November 20, 2023, themed "Education without Borders: Pathways to Internationalization for Higher Education Institutions." The hybrid event, hosted at Manila Central University and online, gathered over 170 participants from various private HEIs. The summit was conducted in hybrin mode. Experts shared insights on global trends, best practices, and challenges in internationalization, while discussions focused on policies, standards, and strategies to enhance international and transnational education programs. The summit fostered networking and collaboration among institutions, laying the groundwork for future partnerships.







PACU and University of Perpetual Help System DALTA - Las Piñas hosts the 6th LAMP Summit

The 6th Leadership and Management Perspectives (LAMP) Summit on May 31, 2024, at the University of Perpetual Help System DALTA - Las Piñas, themed "Lifelong Learning Pathways: Revolutionizing Education Through Microcredentials and Digital Badges." The event attracted around 140 participants from both PACU and non-PACU private higher education institutions. The summit highlighted the transformative potential of microcredentials and digital badges in revolutionizing education and skill acquisition, with experts sharing best practices for integrating these into academic and professional development programs. The discussions fostered innovation and encouraged collaboration among institutions to implement future-proof strategies for lifelong learning.





AI Summit 2024: Advancing AI Capability Promoting AI Safety

March 18-19, 2024, University of Santo Tomas

The University of Santo Tomas, in collaboration with the PACU Committee on Institutional Quality Improvement and USAID's UPSKILL Program, hosted the AI Summit on March 18-19, 2024. Centered on the theme "Advancing AI Capability, Promoting AI Safety," the summit built upon discussions from the PACU AI Policy Write Shop held earlier that month. It gathered over 400 educators, researchers, industry practitioners, and government leaders to explore the responsible use of AI in education, the workplace, and society, offering timely insights into AI's evolving impact.





PACU South Korea Benchmarking Programme May 22-26, 2024, Seoul, South Korea

With support from USAID's UPSKILL Program, the CIQI Committee conducted a Transnational Education Benchmarking Visit to South Korea on May 22-26, 2024. This initiative aimed to strengthen the capacities of PACU member school presidents and officers by exploring best practices in global and transnational higher education (TNHE). The program included visits to top institutions such as Incheon Global Campus, UNESCO's Asia-Pacific Centre of Education for International Understanding, Kyungwoon University, and the National Institute for Lifelong Education, focusing on areas like e-learning, lifelong learning, and TNHE.

PACU representatives visited key educational institutions in South Korea, engaging in knowledge exchanges that emphasized their commitment to internationalization and quality education. The itinerary also featured a cultural tour, including Bukchon Hanok Village and Gyeongbokgung Palace, where participants experienced traditional Korean culture, donning Hanbok attire and exploring the nation's rich heritage, fostering stronger bonds among PACU officers.

The benchmarking program saw an enthusiastic response from PACU member schools, with seventeen (17) representatives signing up to take part in the trip.








Eskwelabs

PACU is exploring a collaboration with Eskwelabs to develop a Data Literacy and Analytics with AI for Education learning sprints. This 1.5 day in-person learning sprint or 4-part webinar series that will be scheduled in January 2025. It will culminate in a micro-credential in data analytics. The initiative aims to engage leaders and decision-makers from Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), with a focus on key areas such as lifelong learning, Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI), digital transformation, and harnessing data to enhance student learning and faculty development. This collaboration seeks to equip HEI leaders with the tools to drive innovation and educational excellence in an increasingly data-driven world.





Through these key events, the Industry-Academe Linkage Committee has successfully promoted collaboration and innovation in workforce development. By fostering strong partnerships between academia and industry, the committee has played a crucial role in addressing the skills gap, preparing students for the modern workforce, and driving the future of education in the Philippines.

PACU's Research Committee Accomplishments: Creating New Milestones in PACU Leadership and Innovation

ver the past two years, the leadership of the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU) has showcased a robust commitment to advancing research, capacity building, and innovative practices in private higher education. Under the PACU Research Committee, several key initiatives were undertaken to address pressing issues in the academic landscape. These efforts reinforced PACU's mission to uphold high standards in Philippine private education while providing a platform for significant contributions to the country's academic and social development.

PACU has long been at the forefront of advocating for complementarity, academic freedom, and reasonable regulation, all in pursuit of quality education. The 2022–2024 leadership exemplified this vision through groundbreaking programs and collaborations that addressed the needs of the academic community and prepared them for future challenges.

Empowering Researchers through Horizon Europe Collaboration

On May 5, 2023, PACU partnered with EURAXESS to offer an Info Session on Funding and Collaboration Opportunities under Horizon Europe. EURAXESS is a pan-European initiative designed to promote researcher mobility and career development, supporting researchers globally who are looking to collaborate with Europe. This virtual event gathered over 200 institutions, offering access to European Union research grants and programs that reached more than 800 individuals via social media platforms.



The session opened doors for Philippine researchers, scientists, educators, and students to participate in international research projects, providing opportunities for collaboration and funding under Horizon Europe.

EURAXESS Worldwide, which supports researchers outside Europe, offers vital networking tools and personalized assistance. The initiative's widespread network, including more than 600 centers across Europe, ensures inclusive support for researchers, promoting mobility and scientific collaboration.

By fostering connections with European research institutions and showcasing opportunities in funding, EURAXESS has empowered local researchers and institutions to engage in world-class research. The result has been a stronger collaboration network between Philippine and European researchers, enriching the country's research ecosystem.


Addressing Learning Loss in Basic Education

In response to the widespread learning loss exacerbated by the pandemic, PACU organized a pivotal workshop on May 29, 2023, titled "How Can Colleges and Universities Absorb and Mitigate the Risks of Learning Loss in Basic Education Institutions?". The event was held in collaboration with Thames International School and revealed concerning data from the Philippine Assessment for Learning Loss Solutions (PALLS), showing that students from Grades 2 to 12 scored below the passing percentage in science, mathematics, and English.

The workshop underscored the significant impact of



learning gaps among senior and junior high school students, raising awareness of the challenges higher education institutions face in accepting students with these gaps. PACU's leadership urged academic leaders to take collective action, reviewing the K-12 curriculum to mitigate these learning losses and enhancing remediation efforts at both the basic and higher education levels.



Supporting Out-of-School Youths through USAID Grants

PACU's collaboration with USAID through the Opportunity 2.0 Grants Info Session on June 27, 2023, is a testament to its commitment to providing inclusive education and opportunities for all. The USAID-funded Opportunity 2.0 program is specifically designed to make a meaningful impact on the lives of Filipino out-of-school youth (OSY), offering them a "second chance" at education and pathways to quality livelihood and employment.



Opportunity 2.0 aims to reach at least 180,000 out-of-school youth over the next five years. In addition to supporting youth, the program will train more than 1,600 teachers and trainers and engage 2,200 employers in 15 cities, establishing programmatic hubs in Metro Manila, Metro Cebu, and Metro Davao. By collaborating with key national and local agencies such as the Department of Education (DepEd) and the Technical Education Skills and Development Authority (TESDA), as well as city governments, private businesses, academe, NGOs, and youth representatives, this initiative offers comprehensive support to ensure that young people can overcome the barriers they face.

Opportunity 2.0 equips OSYs with the knowledge and skills to succeed, particularly in employment and entrepreneurship. Through this program, PACU member institutions play a critical role in transforming vulnerable youth into empowered members of society capable of pursuing their dreams. The initiative contributes to the individual growth of these youths and strengthens the Philippines' social and economic fabric by aligning the educational system with the country's workforce needs.

Through this impactful collaboration, PACU member institutions have been empowered to support youth in overcoming significant challenges, offering them opportunities for personal and professional growth. By participating in such a transformative project, PACU continues to exemplify its leadership in addressing societal issues through education and innovation.



Transforming Higher Education through UPSKILL's Accelerator Program

Another milestone during the 2022–2024 leadership was PACU's active participation in the UPSKILL Transformation Accelerator Program, launched in collaboration with the University Design Institute and funded by USAID. The Accelerator Program is a 12-month initiative to strengthen higher education institutions (HEIs) in the

Philippines, providing workshops, mentoring, and specialist support to help institutions identify and address critical challenges in higher education.

Participating HEIs undergo a three-phase program, which includes access to road-mapping sessions, workshops on design thinking, and opportunities for USAID grant funding to implement transformation projects. The Accelerator Program is designed to drive innovation by fostering ideation and rapid prototyping of solutions specific to the challenges faced by Philippine higher education institutions. Themes such as building research capabilities, integrating technology for increased

academic quality, and expanding access to underserved communities are at the core of this initiative.

UPSKILL has provided Philippine HEIs with the tools and capacity to align their projects with national development priorities, including those set out in the Philippine Development Plan (2023–2028) and the Commission on Higher Education's (CHED) strategic initiatives. Through this program, PACU member schools are equipped to contribute innovative solutions to pressing educational and social challenges, ensuring a significant impact on their communities and regions.

hese initiatives underscore PACU's unwavering commitment to promoting quality, inclusivity, and collaboration, reinforcing the association's role as a transformative force in Philippine higher education. As PACU continues to lead the way, its efforts will undoubtedly have a lasting impact on the academic and social fabric of the country.

COCOPEA-PACU Dinner and Consultation Meeting with Secretary Juan Edgardo M. Angara



he Coordinating Council of Private Educational Associations and the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities organized a welcome dinner and consultation for the newly appointed Department of Education Secretary Juan Edgardo "Sonny" Angara last July 16, 2024, at Holiday Inn Suite Makati.

The event was attended by key figures in the Private Education Sector, including representatives from COCOPEA member associations, namely the Catholic Educational Association of the Philippines (CEAP), the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU), the Association of Christian Schools and Universities (ACSCU), the Philippine Association of Private Schools, Colleges and Universities (PAPSCU), and the Unified TVET of the Philippines Inc. (UniTVET).

Also present were school heads and presidents from the Manila Archdiocesan and Parochial Schools Association, Inc. (MAPSA), the Davao Colleges and Universities Network (DACUN), the Association of Private, State Colleges, and Universities in Region XI (APSCUR XI), and the Bicol Association of Private Colleges and Universities (BAPCU). Special guests included PEAC Executive Director Rhodora Ferrer, Officers from Stratbase Consulting Group- Orlando Oxales and Rupert Paul Manhit; EDCOMII Executive Director Karol Mark Yee, and EDCOMII Chief Legal Officer Atty. Joseph Estrada.

Secretary Sonny M. Angara emphasized the need to enhance collaboration between the public and private education sectors to operationalize complementarity. He acknowledged the significant impact of the pandemic on private schools and stressed the importance of implementing supportive measures to ensure their resilience.

Secretary Angara expressed optimism about the upcoming partnership between the Department of Education (DepEd) and COCOPEA and emphasized its potential to enhance educational outcomes nationwide. He concluded his remarks by highlighting the pivotal role of education in securing the nation's future and affirmed his commitment to shaping policies that promote educational

resilience and sustainability in the face of evolving challenges.

An open forum followed his speech, during which he was asked the following questions:

How will you define yourself as we partner private education with you as the leader in basic education?

- He would like to be known as the secretary who opened DepEd to different sectors and achieved a fruitful, quality education, improving the skills of our youth. He also acknowledges that some of his aspirations may take some time to achieve and may not get credit for them, but it is important to start building bridges that can be passed on as a legacy.

Is there a possibility for the increase of vouchers for all of the beneficiaries and to have a more sustainable budget?

- Increasing subsidies per student can be a bit more complex. But there is already a review to increase this through tiers, which is being looked upon to ensure balance. Regardless, Sec. Angara affirmed that he is expressing his support in this.

They are expanding the voucher program to "lower grades" nationwide to strengthen complementarity and expanding the Brigada program or other projects aligned with their strengths (health, science, community service, etc.) to fulfill the current shortages, depending on the need.

- He answered that it is a very practical solution that he supports. He further shared that studying this information will be vital to ensure its success.
- Dr. Karol Mark Yee and ED Rhodora Ferrer also shared the current efforts of their agencies in formulating a "private school mapping" to determine overcapacity in private schools for a more effective assessment.

Follow up on harmonizing GMRC and CL/VE: Since most Catholic schools are mostly diocesan, separating these subjects means being compelled to allocate more funds to teachers and become more financially vulnerable.

- Sec. Angara expressed his support as long as it complies with the law.

Advocacy of Technical and Vocational Education and Training is critical to preparing students without the intention or means to finish college. How will the Secretary promote TVET for students with enough capacity and skills to work despite not attending college?

- He affirmed this statement. TVET is essential for students to maximize their potential and be culturally appropriate in the Philippines. He shared the Pathways Bill that would help students to have opportunities to maximize this option to have some financial stability whether they go through college or not.

Concerns in vouchers for students and teachers were raised about its sustainability.

- He is unsure whether or when to look for the expenditure programs, but with his current knowledge, he is hopeful about the possibility of increasing this.

Will a law exist to institutionalize research and decolonization in our country and incentivize institutions to establish these programs?

- Sec. Angara positively affirmed the possibility of incentives and his support of promoting entrepreneurial mindsets for students. He also expressed gratitude for bringing up decolonization to be considered as he moves forward in his new role.

What are your thoughts on K+10+2?

- Until the law is amended, he is committed to overcoming challenges such as a lack of competency and credentials, aiming to make students more employable.

Other participants also expressed their support in Sec. Angara wishes a fruitful collaboration with the new Education Secretary.

Overall, the event signifies an optimistic beginning of a productive collaboration between the government, private education, and its associations to address the problems in our educational system and improve the quality of education for every Filipino student.



COCOPEA Holds National Congress: Collaboration Key to Education Reform



he Coordinating Council of Private Educational Associations (COCOPEA) held its National Congress on July 1-2, 2024, at the SMX Aura Convention Center. Themed "Leading Educational Frontiers Together," the congress brought together over 400 delegates from private schools across the Philippines to discuss pressing issues and chart a path forward for Philippine education. The federation, following rotational leadership, is presently led by the Catholic Educational Association of the Philippines (CEAP).

Day 1: Charting the Course

CEAP President Fr. Albert N. Delvo opened the event, emphasizing the importance of collaboration in navigating the evolving educational landscape. He highlighted challenges like the impact of AI, foreign influence, and the need for a stronger voice for private education in the Philippines.

The keynote forum featured Congressman Mark O. Go, Chair of the House Committee on Higher and Technical Education, Cong. Roman T. Romulo, Chair of the House Committee on Basic Education and Culture, and Dir. El Cid Castillo, Executive Director for Qualifications and Standards Office, Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA).

Their discussion focused on the private sector's vital role in ensuring quality higher education, equitable access, and continuous improvement. Congressman Go presented proposed legislative measures, including the creation of a tripartite council to address unemployment, a voucher system for underprivileged students, and strengthening public-private partnerships in education.

Building on the theme of collaboration, Congressman Roman T. Romulo, Chair of the House Committee on Basic Education and Culture, advocated for the expansion of the voucher system and the creation of a dedicated bureau for private basic education agencies.

TESDA Executive Director El Cid Castillo concluded Day 1 by underlining the importance of Technical and Vocational







Education and Training (TVET) in empowering Filipinos for the industrial age, guided by the six strategic pillars of the National Technical Education and Skills Development Plan (NTESDP).

Dr. Karol Mark Yee, EDCOM 2 Executive Director, presented their Year 1 report on Philippine education, highlighting significant challenges and proposing steps for private schools to help resolve the learning crisis. He urged private schools to offer region-specific programs, collaborate with DepEd to align teacher specialization and conduct research to tackle learning poverty. Additionally, he recommended understanding PISA performance issues, supporting early education nutrition and literacy, mapping private schools, participating in teacher education surveys, applying for the EDCOM 2 - Ateneo Research Fellowship, and partnering for volunteer and internship opportunities.

Day 2: Building Bridges

The second day focused on fostering collaboration between public and private schools. Experts explored strategies for maximizing the strengths of both sectors, emphasizing the need for increased investment, student safety, and transparency.

Senator Win Gatchalian stressed the need for graduates with creative thinking skills and called for a revamped Senior High School curriculum aligned with industry needs to prepare students for the job market.

The final session highlighted the importance of partnerships between educational institutions and businesses. Experts discussed future job market trends, with growth expected in high-skilled fields like healthcare, science, technology, and engineering. E-commerce was also identified as a growth area, creating opportunities in warehousing and online marketing. Collaboration between schools and businesses was emphasized as key to preparing students for this evolving job landscape.

The 2024 COCOPEA National Congress was overseen by COCOPEA Chairperson and CEAP President Fr. Albert N. Delvo, with Br. Edmundo L. Fernandez, FSC, serving as the Program Design Committee Chairperson and supported by CEAP National Secretariat led by Executive Director Mr. Jose Allan I. Arellano.

The congress highlighted that through unified efforts, both public and private institutions can foster a more efficient and fair educational landscape to benefit Filipino students.
